SUBJECT	HISTORY
OVERVIEW	A high-quality history education will help students gain a coherent knowledge and understanding of Britain's past and that of the wider world. It should inspire students' curiosity to know more about the past. Teaching should equip students to ask perceptive questions, think critically, weigh evidence, sift arguments, and develop perspective and judgement. History helps students to understand the complexity of people's lives, the process of change, the diversity of societies and relationships between different groups, as well as their own identity and the challenges of their time.
KEY STAGE 3	Students will extend and deepen their chronologically secure knowledge and understanding of British, local and world history, so that it provides a well-informed context for wider learning. Students will be able to know and understand significant aspects of the history of the wider world e.g. the nature of ancient civilisations and the expansion and dissolution of empires. They will make connections, draw contrasts, and analyse trends within these periods. They will demonstrate understanding of how different types of historical sources are used rigorously to make historical claims and discern how and why contrasting arguments and interpretations of the past have been constructed. Through this learning students will gain an historical perspective by placing their growing knowledge into different contexts, understanding the connections between local, regional, national and international history; between cultural, economic, military, political, religious and social history; and between short- and long-term timescales.
KEY STAGE 4	The students will follow Edexcel GCSE History (9-1) covering three papers: <i>Paper 1</i> Thematic study and historic environment: Crime and punishment in Britain, c1000–present <i>and</i> Whitechapel, c1870–c1900: crime, policing and the inner city <i>Paper 2</i> Period Study: The American West, 1835–1895, <i>and</i> British Depth Study: Early Elizabethan Era, 1558-88 <i>Paper 3</i> - Modern Depth Study: Weimar and Nazi Germany 1918 – 1939. Students will extend their knowledge and understanding of specified key events, periods and societies in local, British, and wider world history. They will engage in historical enquiry to develop as independent learners and as critical and reflective thinkers. Students will question the past, investigate issues critically and make valid historical claims by using a range of sources in their historical context. They will develop an awareness of why people, events and developments have been accorded historical significance, and how and why different interpretations have been constructed.
