Message from the Headteacher

One of the greatest challenges for all schools as we move deeper in the 21st century is to further develop a learning culture in our schools which enables young people to become increasingly resilient. Many employers talk about resilience being the top of their list of qualities that they want to see in future employees and this is a reflection of the demands, stresses and ever varying challenges of professional life in the global workplace.

Resilience is a hot word at the moment, and is generally understood to mean the ability to bounce back from disappointment and to adapt to things we can't change. It's an important character trait that we want to encourage and build in our students. The act of teaching our children resilience can be hard for parents, carers and teachers, because we naturally want to protect our children from failure and disappointment. The good news is you can help prepare them for life's storms, because resilience is a 'work-in-progress' and something that we can continue to develop throughout our lives.

What helps a child to be resilient? There are many factors including knowing you have family and friends who care for you and can be depended on to help and support you. Equally important though is to teach students strategies that help them become more resilient—strategies for problem-solving, flexible thinking, and anxiety management—but we need to plan ahead. We need to teach students these skills when they are calm—not in the middle of a crisis. At All Saints we are working with all our wonderful young people to help them become confident and independent and manage even when for them it is phenomenally difficult. We know that by working with you as parents and carers we will together achieve this goal.

Careers Festival
