



The last task we did was a sketch map of the beach landscape, including the coastal management items such as offshore breakwaters and labelling the picture to clarify what each thing was.






Lower Juniors

It is perfect for good people who care about the environment.




My sweet is called Mood Chew Marble and it's a round blue ball.


We love seeing what our students have been doing outside of school....
